

Votes Received by Winner

45% Three-Candidate Races

38% Four-Candidate Races



Options to Consider

- Traditional
- Runoff Election
- Top-Two Primary Election
- Ranked-Choice Voting
- Approval Voting



Traditional Voting

- "First-past-the-post"
- Most common
- Used by 34 states

E Runoff Election

- Used by 10 states
- Ensures candidate wins with a majority of the votes
- Can be as expensive as the original primary
- Decreased voter participation
- Timing


Top-Two Primary

- All candidates on same ballot
- Increased likelihood of moderate candidates
- May reduce voter choice
- Concerns for minor parties
- Used by 4 states



Ranked-Choice Voting

- Instant Runoff Voting
- Voters rank candidates by preference
- Provides more choices to voters
- Learning curve
- Used by 2 states, 23 Utah municipalities, and 26 cities outside of Utah





Approval Voting

- Voters vote for as many candidates as they want
- Third parties won't take away votes from major parties
- May result in a preferred candidate losing to a candidate without a single first choice supporter
- Not widely used
